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## Parking and Motor Vehicle Registration

All motor vehicles (including motorcycles) that park on SUNY Oswego campus property must be registered with the University Police Parking Division, and display an affixed valid parking permit on the lower right corner of the passenger side of the front windshield. *This regulation is in effect 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, and applies to all students (full or part time, taking day or evening classes, graduate or undergraduate, (or auditing), faculty, staff, visitors, guest speakers and conferees.*

Parking permits are issued from the University Police Parking Office (312-3227) located on Rt.104 and New Street near the main entrance to the college. Hours of operation for the Parking Office are as follows: Monday-Friday, 7:30 am-4:45 pm. The Parking Office has extended hours at the beginning of each semester for our customers' convenience.

Online parking registration is available at the following web site, [www.oswego.edu/police](http://www.oswego.edu/police). After registering at our secure site, you can opt to have the permit and printed information about parking mailed to the address that you provide for us, or you can pick it up at the Parking Office. For additional information about our electronic services go to [www.oswego.edu/police](http://www.oswego.edu/police). Paying and appealing citations and viewing your account are other options from this new site.

For students there are two fees involved with registration: **an annual vehicle registration fee and a permit fee that may be paid by the semester or for the entire academic year based upon your preference.**

### Mandatory Parking Fee Rates

Annual vehicle registration fee .....	\$10.00 plus tax
*Full time (12 hours or more) Parking permit fee.....	\$50.00 plus tax -- Per full semester (Fall/Spring)
*Part time (11 hours or less) Parking permit fee .....	\$25.00 plus tax -- Per full semester (Fall/Spring)
*Summer Parking permit fee.....	\$20.00 plus tax

\*Full or part time status is calculated based on the number of credit hours the student is registered for, **whether or not the instruction occurs on SUNY Oswego campus or at an off site location.**

Outstanding parking obligations from previous semesters must be paid in full prior to registering for classes. There are no exceptions to this policy. **Holds will not be removed until obligations have been paid.** We accept Visa, MasterCard, Discover, American Express, cash and checks as forms of payment.

### Late registrants are charged a fee to register.

Matriculated students may register without additional fees until December 31, 2007.

New students may register until the first day of the semester without additional fees.

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## HOLD INFORMATION

All students are required to read and affirm commitment to abide by the Code of Conduct. You can read this information online and then either respond online or on the registration form. Students are required to do this one time only. If you have not done so already, please read and respond before trying to register.

NYS law mandates that all students be informed about Meningococcal Meningitis and have an opportunity to decide whether to receive immunization. You can read this information online and answer the questions online or on the registration form. You need to give a date of prior immunization or decline immunization. Once the questions are answered the Registration Hold will be lifted immediately.

In addition to the Meningitis requirement the college also has a Measles Mumps Rubella (MMR) immunization requirement. Before attending classes students must provide proof of immunization to MMR. Information about this is available on the Walker Health Center web page. The two exceptions to the requirement are; students who were born before 1957; and students who are enrolled exclusively in Distance Learning courses. Failure to comply with this requirement will result in a student's interim suspension from the college and termination of their student status.

The Student Accounts Office requires that students accept their charges before registration can occur. If you choose not to accept your charges, registration on the web will not be allowed.

The Parking Office and other offices place holds that will stop you from registering. Please check your holds online at [myoswego.oswego.edu](http://myoswego.oswego.edu) before attempting to register.

## **ADVANCED REGISTRATION:**

**October 29-November 16, 2007**

Students Matriculated at Oswego State for Fall 2007 are eligible to take advantage of Advanced Registration.

**Matriculated Graduate Students** are eligible to register beginning the first day of Advanced Registration.

**Matriculated Undergraduate Students** are sent an email, to their Oswego email address, notifying them when they can go on their myOswego account to check registration information. Students can check their major, class standing, holds affecting registration, and their appointment start time.

Note: Registration is restricted for all first semester juniors (57-71 sh) until you see your advisor.

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## **CONTINUING REGISTRATION:**

**November 26-December 31, 2007**

Some major restrictions are lifted at the beginning of Continuing Registration.

**All registered students** may try to add courses that were previously restricted to them.

**Matriculated Undergraduate Students** must register by December 31, 2007 or incur a late fee of \$30.00.

**Readmitted Students** approved for the Spring 2008 semester may begin registering during Continuing Registration. Readmitted students are not allowed to register until they have met the advisement requirements of their school/department. Please refer to your readmittance acceptance letter for details.

**Non-matriculated students** can begin registering for classes on November 26, 2007.

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## **LATE REGISTRATION:**

**January 2-January 23, 2008**

**Matriculated undergraduate students who have not processed any registration:** Will have to fill out a Permit to Late Register Form through the Registrar's Office. You may contact the Registrar's Office (315-312-2136 or [registra@oswego.edu](mailto:registra@oswego.edu)) any time during Late Registration to get your Permit to Late Register Form processed. Once your Permit to Late Register Form has been processed you will be able to register online.

**Important:** Students requesting a Permit to Late Register will be charged a \$30.00 late registration fee. An additional \$30.00 administrative fee is charged if you do not pay your bill before the first day of classes.

**Graduate students and non-matriculated undergraduate students** have until 5 BUSINESS DAYS AFTER THE FIRST CLASS MEETING to register by paper registration form. Payment is due at the time of registration.

**Note:** Registrations Submitted After the 5 Day Deadline Will be Charged a Late Registration Fee of \$30.00.

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## **Program Adjustments (Add/Drops\*):**

**Adds: January 24-February 4, 2008**

**Drops: January 24-February 13, 2008**

Departments determine which of their courses are available for add/drop. Most courses can be added and dropped on the web. A small group can only be added with an online override or a program adjustment form. It is to your advantage to try to do your program adjustments on the web as it will cut down or eliminate your having to go to each instructor and get their signature. Please use the program adjustment form only when signatures are required.

### **Instructions for using a Program Adjustment Form:**

For classes that a student must (or chooses) to use a program adjustment form, please be sure to fill out the top of the form completely. List all courses to be added and/or all courses to be dropped. Secure each instructor's signature and the last date of attendance (for drops) for all classes. Bring the form to the Registrar's Office by the posted Add/Drop deadlines.

**\*Note:** Graduate students and non-matriculated undergraduate students must use the **ADD/DROP Form** to add or drop a class once classes have started (1/24/08).

**To DROP** a course you need the instructor's signature with last date of attendance.

**To ADD** a course you need the instructor's signature if the course is closed.

Each student should check with the Office to see that the Enrollment Certification and, if necessary, any supporting documents are in order. Returning students can expect to receive their first check four to six weeks after the beginning of the semester. Recipients of Veteran's benefits at Oswego State should be very aware of the semester certification policy. All recipients are required to come to the Office of Veteran's Services at the beginning and end of each semester to verify their enrollment status. Failure to do so will result in termination of VA Benefits.

## COURSE WITHDRAWAL GUIDELINES

### Matriculated Undergraduate:

The last day to drop a semester course without liability is January 23, 2008. Students may continue to drop on the web through February 13, 2008, but there is fee liability beginning January 24.

Course withdrawal from February 14 through March 28, 2008 must be done on a Withdrawal Form with the necessary signatures and there is a \$15 fee.

A grade of WP will be assigned by the instructor if the student is passing the course at the time of filing of the form; a grade of WF will be assigned by the instructor if the student is failing the course at the time of filing of the form; a grade of WN will be assigned by the instructor if no grade has been established at the time of filing of the form. These grades are not used to calculate a GPA, but the hours are counted as hours for which the student was enrolled that semester.

Course withdrawal from March 31 through May 9, 2008 may be petitioned if a student believes that their circumstances are extraordinary (poor performance in a course is *not* an extraordinary circumstance). It must be done on a Late Documented Withdrawal Form, have the necessary signatures, have documentation (e.g., a health care provider's verification of student illness [physical or psychological] or of major illness of immediate family member; copy of obituary, listing relationship of deceased to student, letter from student's employer) submitted with the form and there is a \$15 fee.

A grade of WP will be assigned by the instructor if the student is passing the course at the time of filing of the form; a grade of WF will be assigned by the instructor if the student is failing the course at the time of filing of the form; a grade of WN will be assigned by the instructor if no grade has been established at the time of filing of the form. These grades are not used to calculate a GPA, but the hours are counted as hours for which the student was enrolled that semester.

### Matriculated Graduate:

The last day to drop a semester course without liability is January 23, 2008. You may continue to drop courses from January 24 through February 13, 2008, using an ADD/DROP Form with instructor signature. There will be fee liability. (If you never attended you must have the instructor write "never attended" on the ADD/DROP Form or there will be some liability.)

Drops done from February 14 through May 9, 2008 must be completed on an ADD/DROP Form and be signed by the Graduate Dean. There will be a \$15 fee and some liability.

1. Examination time and date for classes that meet on an irregular schedule will be according to the schedule for the first period during which the class begins. For example, a class that meets on Monday, 2:00-4:45 p.m., is to follow the schedule for Monday at 1:50 because the class begins during this period.

### Rights Granted to Students Under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974.

#### *What records can a student see?*

Under the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, students have the right to inspect and review education records. In addition, they have a right to an explanation and interpretation of those records, including the right to a hearing to challenge the contents of such records. Requests for an explanation concerning a record should be addressed to the college official in charge of the record. Academic records, supporting documents and general education records are maintained by the Registrar, academic departments and advisors and the Dean's Offices; records of disciplinary proceedings by the Vice President for Student Services; financial records by the Financial Aid Office; placement records by the Career Planning and Placement Office; and counseling records by the Counseling Services Center. All such records are the property of the college.

#### *What are the records a student can't see?*

The following records are not available for student inspection: records of instructional supervisory and administrative personnel which are in the sole possession of the maker thereof and which are not accessible to other persons; records created or maintained by a physician, psychiatrist, psychologist or other recognized professional or paraprofessional which are used only in connection with the provisions of treatment of a student and are not available to persons other than those individuals providing such treatment; records and documents of a law enforcement unit, including those of the college's University Police Department; financial records of students' parents; confidential letters and statements of recommendation placed in a student's file prior to January 1, 1975, or those received after January 1, 1975, for which the student has signed a waiver of his/her right to access.

#### *Can others see a student's records?*

Information in a student's education records will not be released to third parties without the student's written consent, except to the following: officials of this college, including instructional staff, who have legitimate educational interests; officials of other schools in which the student seeks to enroll; accrediting organizations; federal and state educational authorities and organizations conducting studies for such authorities in the areas of testing, student aid and instruction; people seeking information pursuant to a judicial order or subpoena; and appropriate people in connection with an emergency involving health or safety.

Directory information - student's name, address, telephone number, age, photographs, major field of study, class year, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received and most recent previous educational institution attended - may be made public by the college unless the student requests the Registrar, in writing, that such information be released only upon his/her consent. For more information on access to student records, see the college's Code of Student Rights, Responsibilities and Conduct in the Student Handbook. ## Address Changes

It is the student's responsibility to keep the college informed of any address changes. Bills, enrollment verification, and other important materials depend on accurate mailing addresses to reach their destination. Please note that you can keep a mailing, as well as, a local address. This way, your mail will reach you even after you have gone home at the end of the semester. Changes and corrections to local and/or home addresses can be submitted by filing a "Change of Address Notice" available at student services offices throughout the campus or through your myOswego web account.

## Audit Policy

*General Policy* - A person is permitted to audit courses without credit if the instructor of the course determines that the person has an acceptable reason for auditing, that the person has sufficient academic background to benefit from the course, and that there is room in the class. The extent of an auditor's participation in class is determined by the instructor. A Permission to Audit form, available in the Office of the Registrar, signed by the instructor, should be submitted to the Office of the Registrar. Audited courses are not entered on transcripts.

*Senior Citizens/Audit Policy* - For purposes of this policy, a senior citizen is defined as a person 60 years of age or older. A senior citizen desiring to audit a credit course must complete an "Audit Form for Senior Citizens" in consultation with the Division of Continuing Education. Upon approval by the appropriate department chair, the senior citizen will be informed of the procedure for class admission. It is understood, however, that privileges may be limited by the availability of class space. It is also understood that the audit privileges will not regularly be extended in all studio and laboratory courses. There is no fee or any charge levied by the College for the audit privilege. Text books or other related materials may be purchased at the prevailing student price. Senior citizens should register as an auditor during the late registration/add period at the beginning of each semester. Noncredit courses may not be audited as they are not state supported. Senior citizens may, of course, register for such courses upon payment of the regular fees.

## Course work At Other Colleges

Students may, with prior approval, take course work at other accredited colleges and universities and transfer the credit to their record at Oswego. Students who must satisfy the newest general education requirements (i.e., those entering Oswego with freshman class standing in 2000-2001) should note that courses may be taken off-campus in every general education category except Intellectual Issues; the 6-credit upper-division requirement in that area must be met with course work at Oswego.

Courses from community colleges will be accepted for lower division credit only. A maximum of 62 semester hours of lower division credit may be applied toward the Oswego bachelor's degree. Credit only is transferred for work taken at other institutions. Off-campus study does not become a part of a student's record unless an Off-Campus Study Approval Form, signed by the student's advisor, chairperson of the department in which the equivalent campus course is taught or, where applicable, the Director of General Education, is submitted to the Registrar's Office in advance of completing the coursework.

## **Drops at Instructor Discretion**

Students who have two unexcused absences during the first two class meetings of the semester, **MAY** be dropped from the course at the discretion of the instructor. The instructor or the department offering the course will notify the Registrar of this action, which terminates a student's registration in that course. However, students should not assume that they have been dropped from a class just because the first two classes were missed. It is ultimately the responsibility of students to drop a course that they are not planning to attend by the deadline published in the college calendar. Failure to do this may result in a failing grade for the course.

## **Filing for Graduation**

Deadline to file online for December 2007 graduation is September 30, 2007.

To file online, students are instructed to access [myoswego.oswego.edu](http://myoswego.oswego.edu). Once the student has signed in, the graduation application form is connected to the registration link.

Senior Check Forms are generated once the student has filed online to graduate and are sent directly to the student's advisor. It is the student's responsibility to contact the department of their major(s), and minor(s) if applicable, and sign the Senior Check Form with their advisor. Senior Check Forms for the May graduation ceremony are due back in the graduation area of the Registrar's Office (307 Culkin Hall) no later than November 1, 2007.

***The Senior Check Form is mandatory for graduation.***

Students who are on the December graduation list and do not participate in the ceremony may participate in the May ceremony if they choose.

Please note: If you are unable to file online and need help to do so, you may contact the Graduation Area of the Registrar's Office at 312-2235.

## **Personal Identification Number (PIN)**

Your Personal Identification Number or PIN is a 6 digit number, originally set to your birth date (ex: September 23, 1967 would be PIN 092367). Your PIN (along with your user id) allows you to access your student records. All users are required to change their PIN to help prevent others from trying to access their records. The PIN can be alpha, numeric, or alphanumeric. Make sure you change it to something you will remember the next time you use the web system. If you forget your PIN, use the "Forgot PIN" link on myOswego to reset it. If you forget the answer to your identity question you will be required to come IN PERSON with a valid picture I.D. to the Registrar's Office, 301 Culkin Hall. Under NO circumstances will PIN numbers be given over the phone.

## **Repeating Grades**

Only grades of D+, D, D-, and E can be repeated. Some academic departments require a minimum grade of C- in the courses preceding established sequences and/or all courses in the major. Check with your advisor if you have any grades below C- to make sure you can register for other related courses in the department. For more information on repeated courses see the college catalog or your advisor.

## **Semester Hour Load**

An undergraduate student must carry a minimum of 12 semester hours per semester to be considered a full-time student. An undergraduate student is permitted to take a maximum of 17 semester hours. Exceptions are made for students majoring in Vocational Teacher Preparation, and for graduating seniors (who have filed at the Registrar's Office to graduate the next semester), all of whom may register for up to 18 semester hours and Technology Education majors who may register for 19 semester hours, during the advanced registration period without special written permission. All other students may increase their course load at the beginning of the semester, during the add/drop period, with their Advisor's written permission on an add/drop form.

## **Time Requirements for Courses**

In the Commissioner's Regulations it states that a 3 semester hour course must meet for a total of 2250 minutes. It may be necessary (because of a holiday for example) to schedule an additional class or to add time to each class meeting in order to meet this regulation. If such is necessary, the instructor will inform the class as to how this time will be made up.

## **Withdrawal From College**

A student who finds it necessary or advisable to withdraw from the College must obtain a withdrawal form from the Student Advisement Office, complete an exit interview, obtain signatures from Student Accounts, Financial Aid Office, and the Residence Life and Housing Office), and return the form to the Registrar's Office. Failure to withdraw officially will jeopardize the student's chances for readmission or recommendation by the College. No fees can be refunded without full compliance with this policy.

A student after having complied with the provisions above, may withdraw from the College during the stated withdrawal period, as established in the Official College Calendar. A grade of WP will be assigned by the instructor if the student is passing the course at the time of the withdrawal: a grade of WF will be assigned by the instructor if the student is failing the course at the time of the withdrawal: a grade of WN will be assigned by the instructor if no grade has been established at the time of the withdrawal. These grades are not used to calculate GPA's, but the hours are counted as hours for which the student was enrolled that semester.

Students withdrawing from the college after the last day of the ninth week of the semester and who have documented extenuating circumstances beyond the student's control may be assigned grades of WP, WF, or WN, as described above and consistent with the policy on Late Course Withdrawal. Students unable to provide such documentation will receive the letter grade awarded by the instructor based on the work submitted for the entire semester.

# GE2000–GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

Students graduating under the “OLD” GENERAL EDUCATION or the GE 98 requirements should consult the appropriate link on the General Education Website (<http://www.oswego.edu/gened/>) or consult previous course registration newspapers for lists of approved courses. Program requirements may also be found in the undergraduate catalog.

GE 2000 is for all students who entered for the first time as freshmen in Fall 2000 or later and for all transfer students entering in Fall 2002 or later (except those who matriculated at another SUNY unit prior to Fall 2000 - see GE 1998).

## General Education Requirements for B.A., B.S., and B.F.A. Degrees, State University of New York at Oswego

Although students and advisors share the responsibility for the student's progress toward a degree, it is the student who is ultimately obligated to understand and fulfill these requirements. Students are responsible for meeting with advisors, who are assigned by major departments, or, in the case of undeclared students, the Student Advisement Center, 501 Culkin Hall. It is important for all new students to meet with advisors as soon as possible to plan programs carefully. The program is supervised by the Council of General Education. ### NOTES:

- General Education courses may not be taken pass/fail.
- One course can be used to satisfy two (or more) requirements, except that: No course satisfying the American History requirement will at the same time satisfy the Tolerance and Intolerance requirement (in Human Diversity).
- Courses that satisfy requirements for the major or minor can also satisfy General Education requirements.
- General Education courses (with the exception of Intellectual Issues) can be taken off-campus, as long as approval is secured in advance.
- Passing scores on college-level competency exams (e.g., Advanced Placement or CLEP) may be used to earn credits and, where appropriate, satisfy General Education requirements.
- Waiver exams are given at least twice each year for Computer Literacy and Critical Thinking (passing one of these exams satisfies a requirement but earns no credits for the student). Open to new students only.
- Math competency must be demonstrated by the student before he or she enrolls in any math course numbered 106/206 at Oswego.

Students may also continue with graduate work in health promotion, business administration, allied health, and exercise science. The B.S. degree in wellness management is designed to



encourage students to explore individual areas of interest through elective selection. Students are also required to complete at least one internship (2.5 GPA required) in a worksite wellness program prior to graduation.

**Australia**—Oswego currently has eight programs to various universities throughout Australia. All offer a wide curriculum of courses. Exchange opportunities, internships, and student teaching are also available to Oswego students.

**Brazil**—Oswego's in Brazil is at the Pontificia Universidade Catolica de Sao Paulo, (PUC-SP), a secular university. Students study alongside Brazilian students, and are enrolled separately in a Brazilian culture course. A minimum of two semesters of beginning Portuguese is expected. However, students who do not know Portuguese, but have a strong proficiency in Spanish may apply.

**China**—Participants follow a course of Chinese studies, including language, history, culture and art, at Capital Normal University in Beijing. Elementary through advanced Chinese language courses are offered.

**Cuba**—Oswego's Cuba program, located at the Universidad de La Habana, is licensed by the U.S. Treasury Department. This is a direct enrollment program, meaning participants will take classes and exams alongside Cuban students. This program is designed for serious and mature students who want to experience and learn about Cuban history, society, culture and politics. Strong Spanish language ability is required. Open only to Oswego students.

**Czech Republic**—SUNY Oswego's program in the Czech Republic is at Masaryk University in Bruno. Students take courses through the Central European Studies Program or TESOL Teacher Education program.

**France**—Oswego offers three programs in France: SUNY at the Sorbonne in Paris, with courses in language, civilization, and culture; IPAG in Nice, with business courses open to students with very little to no French ability; for students with an intermediate to advanced level of French the MICEFA, Paris Exchange Program offers students the opportunity to study at one of 15 universities in Paris.

**Germany**—Oswego offers one program in Germany at the University of Osnabrueck. One year of German language study is required. Courses in German language and culture, cognitive science, humanities, and more are offered.

**Hungary**—Budapest, the capital city, and Pecs, a southern Hungarian city, are sites for Oswego's two programs in Hungary. At Corvinus University of Budapest and Pecs University, courses are conducted in English through the International Studies Centers.

**Ireland**—Oswego currently offers students the opportunity to study at the University College Dublin at the Faculty of Commerce or the Faculty of Arts.

**Japan**—Oswego offers two programs in Japan: The University of Tsukuba offers courses for its academic year program in Japanese language, culture and society. The Japanese government offers scholarships for study at Tsukuba. In the past, Oswego students have received these scholarships. Participants must have one year of Japanese. The second program at Akita International University offers one semester of study in English in a variety of disciplines.

**Mexico**—Participants in Oswego's program in Mexico enroll in courses at ITESM, a private university, also called Tec de Monterrey. Selected courses are offered in English, and a variety of courses in all subjects are taught in Spanish. Students study in Monterrey, Queretaro, Cuernavaca, Mexico City, Guadalajara and more.

**New Zealand**—Oswego offers three programs in New Zealand: the University of Otago, located in Dunedin; the University of Waikato, in Hamilton; and the Auckland University of Technology, located in Auckland. All programs offer full academic curricula.

**Puerto Rico**—Oswego offers both semester and academic year programs at the University of Puerto Rico, Rio Piedras campus in San Juan. Two years of Spanish language study are required.

**Spain**—Oswego's programs in Spain are at the University of Barcelona. Students study Spanish language and culture and other topics at the Curso de Estudios Hispanicos.

**United Kingdom**—Oswego offers three programs in the U.K. Students can study in London, at the Centre for Academic Programmes Abroad (CAPA) Program, including internship opportunities. The second program is located in Ormskirk at Edge Hill College. This program offers Oswego students the opportunity to do their student teaching in the U.K.

## **Quarter Courses with International Travel**

Oswego's quarter courses with international travel offer Oswego students a three-credit-exploration of the history, geography, and culture of some of the world's great cities and places. The classroom portion of each of these courses take place on campus during one of the quarters of the academic year and the overseas travel portion during the winter intersession, spring break, or at the end of the spring semester. Quarter courses are currently being offered in; Dublin, Edinburgh, London, Madrid, Paris, Rome, Tokyo and more.

## Division of Continuing Education & Summer Sessions

The Division of Continuing Education & Summer Sessions provides advisement for adult students and evening degree students as well as a variety of services to all students at SUNY Oswego. Located in 166 Campus Center, Continuing Education is open Monday through Friday from 8 am to 4:30 pm with extended hours on Tuesday evening until 6:00 pm. Advisement is also available by appointment at the Oswego State Education Center in Phoenix. The Division of Continuing Education represents SUNY Oswego in the North Country Consortium and has an office to accommodate students in that area. To make North Country advisement appointments, call 315.773.9007. The Division, in cooperation with SUNY Oswego's academic departments, offers credit courses at off-campus locations throughout central New York. Programs and services facilitated through Continuing Education include: CLEP exams, GRE subject exams, four evening degrees, two online degrees, Summer Sessions, WinterSession, the International Language and Education Center, distance learning and Safe Schools, Healthy Students (SSHS1020, a series of online workshops required for teacher certification). The four evening degrees offered are Accounting, Business Administration, Information Science, and Public Justice, plus a minor in Economics. The two online degrees offered are Vocational Teacher Preparation and Mass Communication and Broadcasting. Courses in general education, the major, and electives are offered each semester on a rotating basis, in the evening after 5 pm. Adult students may apply as freshman or transfer students. The staff members of the Division of Continuing Education are also available to assist individuals who are not in degree programs who would like to take part-time course work at SUNY Oswego. #### Customized Software Training

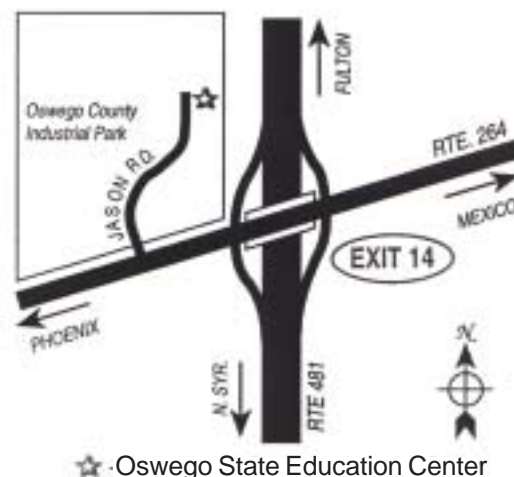

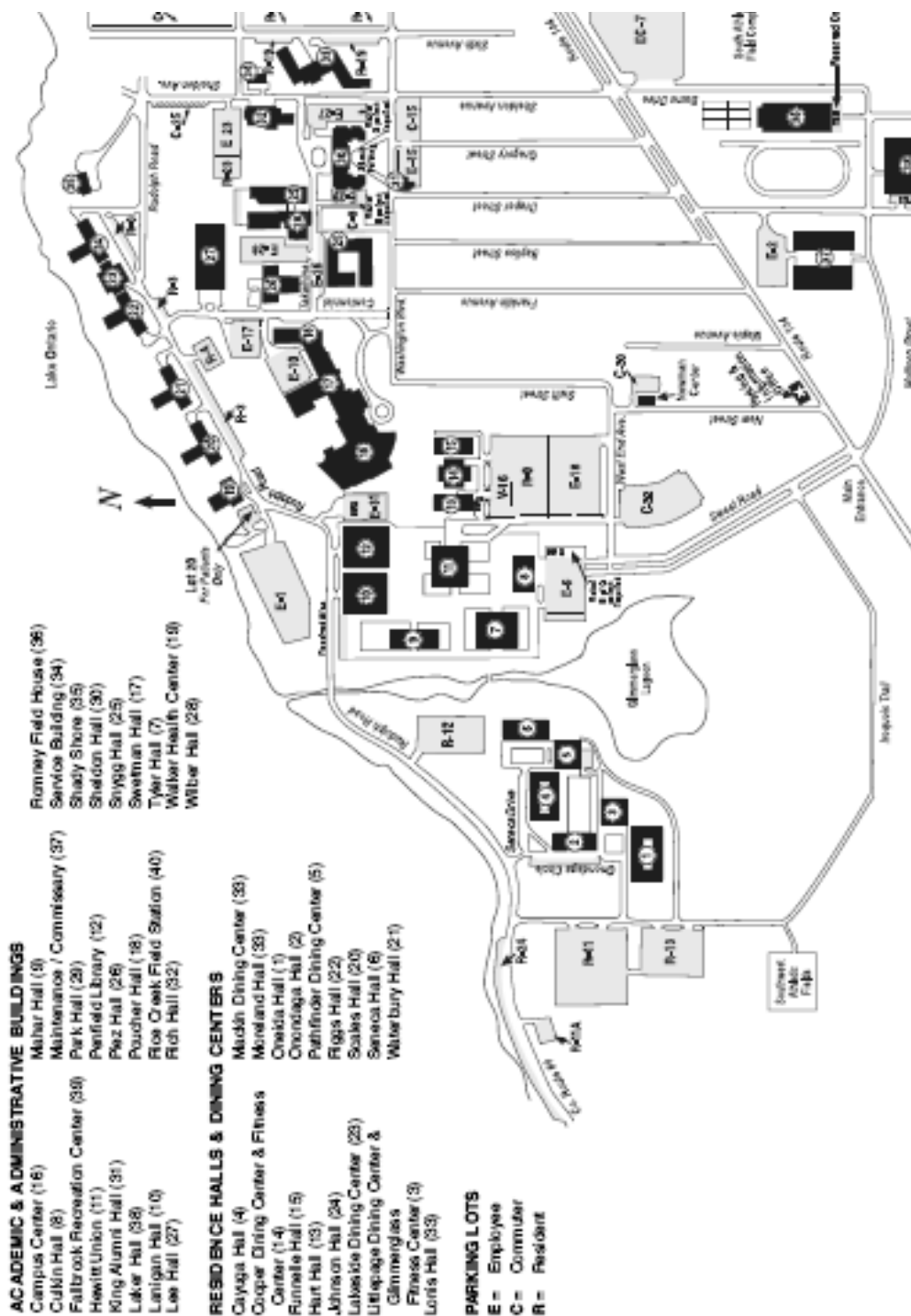
#### CLEP
